

**SB 245 – AN ACT relating to enhanced secure identity documents and making an appropriation therefor.**

Page 1 – Requires every person under 18 to attend traffic school.

Page 2 – Removes ability to refuse to divulge Social Security Number from KRS 186.412.

Page 3 – Circuit Clerks must scan and forward documentation to Transportation Cabinet, then issue a temporary card, the likes of which are not mentioned anywhere in statute as to security.

Page 8 – More than one ID may be held under current law, for example an instruction permit and a personal ID, but no more than one enhanced REAL ID card may be held at any time.

Page 10

Circuit clerks have access to the cabinet database to view driver information.

Page 12

The same picture rule from passport pictures applies to driver's license pictures. However, under federal law there is accommodation made for religious headwear. This state version is more stringent and all is determined by the discretion of the clerk who is untrained in international picture guidelines.

Page 13

Allows both REAL ID and regular IDs, except that there seems to be one database and one method of creation, so what's the difference?

Page 15

We may create a mobile unit for the BOP or DOC to use to enroll inmates leaving custody.

Page 16

Creation of a child ID ages 2-15 only. It can be voluntarily gotten, costs only \$6, and includes picture to be stored in the Driver's database, subject to all the same sharing as others in the database, in addition to the Missing Persons Clearinghouse.

Page 17

There is no non-enhanced option for child's ID.

Page 19

All the changeover, upgrades, creation of a new database, retention of data, security plan for data, and collection of identity documents will be subject to the Transportation Cabinet's will. There are no statutes in place, nor regulations required, that will oversee such a broad sweep of information and collection. Furthermore, identity documents (such as birth certificates, social security cards, etc.), instead of being looked at by the clerk and given back to the subject, will be scanned into the database and stored indefinitely. This will be the largest-scale identity-theft gold mine in human history. The kicker is that the information will be subject to "electronic connectivity" with no less than ***"any other state's driver licensing department, federal agency, national or regional association, or business."***

Page 20

New drivers or residents must get an enhanced REAL ID. Renewals of current cards may choose enhanced or non-enhanced. However, those newcomers ineligible for enhanced can still get non-enhanced. This is where illegals come in. So if you are a citizen who is eligible, you cannot get non-enhanced, but others may. The database and method of receipt and collection of information seems to be the same, however, so no distinction has been made as to why one would want either enhanced or non-enhanced.

Page 22

Allows licenses to those without recognized status, including pending applications for asylum, temporary protected status, or adjustment of status to alien lawfully admitted for permanent or conditional residence.

Page 27

The Circuit Clerk scans all information into the database for permanent collection, storage, and retrievability.

Page 43

Further evidence all information is stored indefinitely: revoked license cards will be destroyed instead of retained by the cabinet.

Page 59

Apparently “enhanced secure” means storing everyone’s data in a database that is shareable with the whole world.

Page 60

We’re dating this out to less than a year before Department of Homeland Security’s deadline for compliance in order to avoid the supposed PR nightmare when Kentucky citizens find out their IDs issued by the state do not meet the muster of the new federalized/policed airports.
